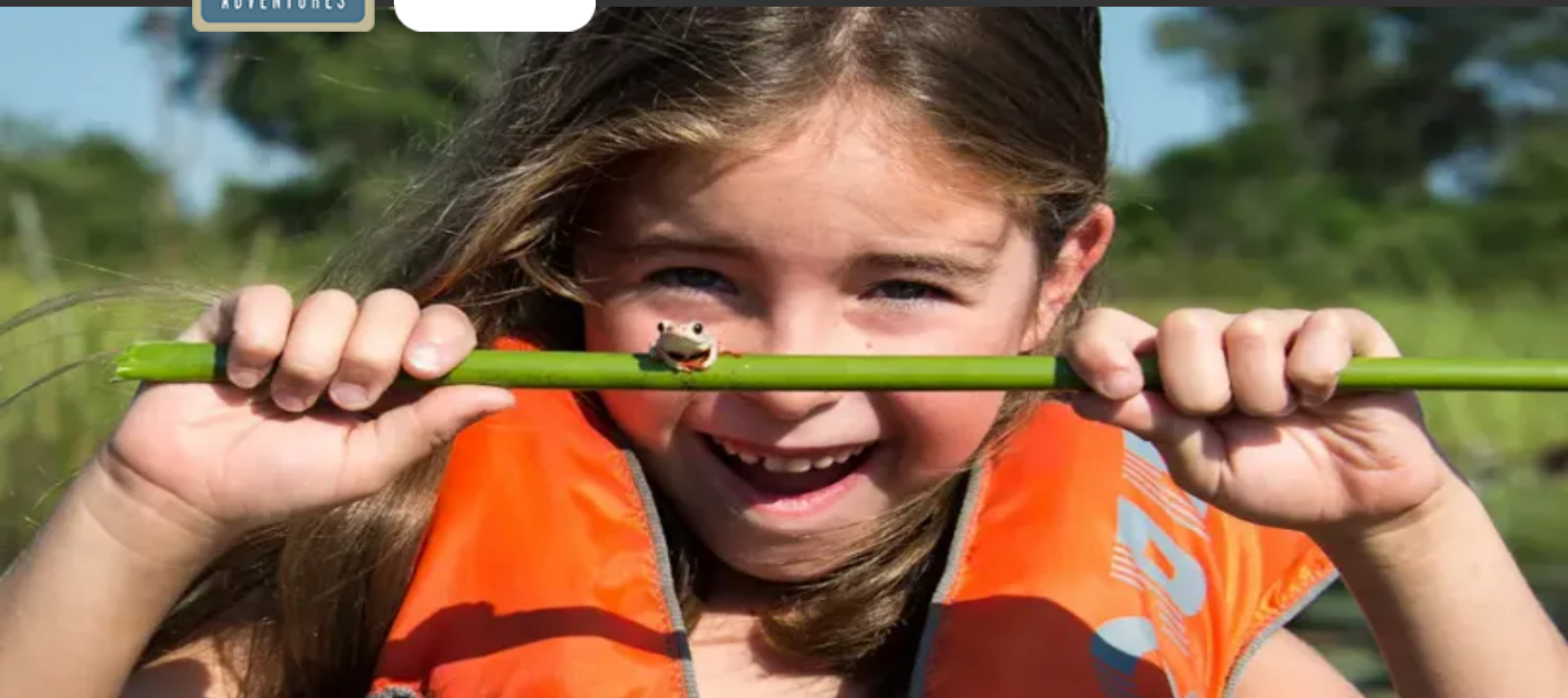

As you watch a cheetah sprint across the savanna or study the green glow of a hyena's eyes at night, "wild life" takes on a whole new meaning! From the vast expanse of the Kalahari Desert with its sprawling salt pans to the emerald marshes of the Okavango Delta and the thunder of Victoria Falls, our Botswana family safari unveils new thrills day by day.

MAUN / KALAHARI DESERT

Days 1 & 2: Encounter Kalahari wildlife along the Boteti River

- Watch elephants at eye level from a floating hide on the Boteti River
- Look for zebras, giraffes, gemsbok, springbok and other desert wildlife
- Walk with San guides who share their culture and knowledge of the Kalahari

Our Botswana family safari begins in Maun, where our Expedition Leader meets us at the airport. Then we're off for Makgadikgadi Pans National Park in the Kalahari Desert—360,000 square miles of sandy, semi-arid savanna that sustains a surprising amount of wildlife. The Makgadikgadi Pans formed when an ancient lake evaporated thousands of years ago, and these shallow depressions are all that remain of once-enormous Lake Makgadikgadi. Today, this vast expanse of salt glitters in the intense dry-season sun, evoking a moonscape, but seasonal rains turn the pans into an important habitat for migrating animals, including Africa's second-largest zebra and wildebeest migration, along with the predators that pursue them.

Our first two days reveal the park's western reaches, where a multitude of game ranges across a landscape of scrub, palms, riverine trees and grassy plains. Our classic tented safari camp overlooks the Boteti River, a lifeline flowing through these parched environs that attracts animals stopping for a drink in front of camp—oryx, gemsbok, springbok, zebra, red hartebeest, wildebeest, Kalahari lion, cheetah, hyena, jackal and ostrich are often on view, along with many smaller mammals, birds and reptiles.

Varied activities will delight family members of all ages, including a 4x4 wildlife drive with a picnic lunch in the bush, and a rare opportunity for a walking safari with local Kalahari bushmen who reveal as much about their indigenous culture as the native plants and wildlife we observe. As the sun sets, enjoy sundowners overlooking the river escarpment where we may view elephants at close range. We often see lounging crocodiles, too—our camp's namesake.



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EASTERN KALAHARI / MAKGADIKGADI PANS

Days 3 - 5: Meet meerkats and explore the Makgadikgadi salt pans

- Spend time with a habituated colony of wild meerkats
- Ride quad bikes across the shimmering salt pans
- Experience some of Africa's finest stargazing from camp

On Day 3, transfer by road to the eastern side of the Kalahari, skirting Makgadikgadi Pans National Park on an overland journey to the best location for accessing the park's vast salt pans. Along the way, learn about the giant baobabs that dot the flat expanse. These quirky-looking ancient trees, prominent landmarks on this terrain for centuries, average more than 4,000 years old.

Our tented camp rests on the edge of the world's largest salt pan, an oasis of comfort shaded by acacias and palms. The Makgadikgadi Pans formed when an ancient lake evaporated thousands of years ago, and these shallow depressions are all that remain of once-enormous Lake Makgadikgadi. Today, this vast expanse of salt glitters in the intense dry-season sun, evoking a moonscape. The only visible plant life is a thin layer of blue-green algae, but seasonal rains will later turn the pans into an important habitat for migrating animals, including wildebeest and one of Africa's largest zebra populations, along with the predators that pursue them. During our visit, look for unusual desert-adapted creatures on private game drives as we head out in search of gemsbok, springbok, red hartebeest, steenbok and many small mammals, birds and reptiles. We'll also interact with a friendly habituated colony of meerkats. Quad bikes offer an exciting way to explore the lunar-like surface of the pans. Back at camp each night, enjoy some of the best stargazing on the planet.



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OKAVANGO DELTA / KHWAI PRIVATE RESERVE

Days 6 - 8: Search for wildlife across Khwai's waterways and floodplains

- Look for lions, leopards and African wild dogs across the private reserve
- Explore reed-lined channels by mokoro with local polers when water levels permit
- Watch elephants and buffalo gather at the camp lagoon

Fly by light aircraft this morning into the contrasting environment of the Okavango Delta. Here in northwest Botswana, the Okavango River fans out over the Kalahari sands to create the world's largest inland delta—5,800 square miles of marsh, clear channels, lagoons and islands comprising a mosaic of diverse wildlife habitat. In 2014, the Okavango Delta became the 1,000th site to be officially inscribed on the UNESCO list of World Heritage Sites.

Our destination is the massive Khwai wildlife reserve, a community concession encompassing riverine woodlands, floodplains, mopane forest and open grasslands. Bordering the famous Moremi Game Reserve, the private conservancy lies along the Khwai River that is a lifeline for the region. Elephants abound, and year-round wildlife includes waterbuck, reedbuck and many antelope species, including red lechwe, along with frequent sightings of lion, leopard and spotted hyena. Khwai's varied habitats also support abundant giraffe, wild dog and the majestic sable antelope for which our camp, Sable Alley, is named. In addition, more than 450 bird species have been recorded. We explore on wildlife drives and by mokoro, the traditional poled canoe of the delta, giving local polers a chance to share their deep knowledge of this ecosystem and how it has sustained their people for generations. Occasionally, when conditions permit, we may also explore on foot with an armed guide.

Our eco-conscious camp on the banks of a peaceful lagoon is part of a community-based partnership that bridges safari tourism with Khwai village life, enhancing economic stability for the local people. Wildlife literally comes to us as elephant, buffalo and herds of plains game arrive to drink. Seasonal waterholes often attract lion, hyena, eland, zebra and kudu, plus an assortment of smaller nocturnal species such as porcupine, genet, jackal and honey badger.



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KHWAI PRIVATE RESERVE / VICTORIA FALLS

Day 9: Fly from the Okavango to the thunder of Victoria Falls

- Travel by light aircraft from the Khwai Reserve
- Walk the rim of Victoria Falls with a private guide
- Join your Expedition Leader for a farewell dinner

Following a last morning wildlife activity on the Khwai Reserve, depart by light aircraft for Kasane, Botswana. After border formalities, continue by road to Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, where we have a privately guided tour of Victoria Falls. The massive cataract is located inside Mosi-oa-Tunya National Park, whose name in the local language means "the smoke that thunders," referring to the mighty falls and its abundant spray. The falls and park together comprise a UNESCO World Heritage Site that spans both sides of the Zambezi River, encompassing terrain in both Zimbabwe and Zambia. We follow a network of trails along the rim to a variety of magnificent vantage points over the mile-wide cataract, which plummets 350 feet into the Zambezi Gorge below. This evening, our Expedition Leader hosts a festive farewell dinner.

***Please note:** In 2027, our itinerary will include a flight from the Khwai Reserve directly to Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, removing the land border crossing and drive from Kasane, Botswana.*

VICTORIA FALLS

Day 10: Meet local families before departing Zambia

- Visit a nearby village for insight into daily life
- Transfer to Victoria Falls Airport for departing flights

This morning, choose to relax or visit a nearby village where kids will love the opportunity to meet African children. Just outside the hustle and bustle of the Victoria Falls tourist zone, we interact with locals tending their crops or going about their chores, enjoying a glimpse into daily rural life. It's a fitting finale to our Botswana family safari, which comes to a close as we transfer to the Victoria Falls airport to meet departing flights later this morning.

Rather than staying in more heavily visited national parks, we concentrate on remote, uncrowded private reserves. Here, in addition to traditional wildlife drives, we have the chance to get out of the truck (always important with kids) and enjoy safely guided bush walks in the company of our Expedition Leader. In addition, we take exciting night drives in search of nocturnal creatures. These are exclusive advantages, since these activities are not permitted in the national parks.

Small, Secluded Camps Offer Memorable Accommodations

Ambiance means a lot on safari. So does your proximity to the animal life that your family traveled so far to see. Stay at intimate, isolated camps that immerse us in nature amid profuse wildlife, rather than other tourists.

Chartered Flights Maximize Your Comfort and Time

Rather than subject your family to long, rough overland drives, we opt for several light aircraft transfers between camps and regions. This means you have more time to spend on safari making great memories together—plus you'll have some pretty amazing aerial views of Botswana's varied landscapes and their wild inhabitants.

Open "Window" Seats Are A Priority

The private state-of-the-art safari vehicles we charter have open sides and nine cushioned passenger seats or shared benches—one in front next to the driver, followed by three rows of three seats each—though we limit our capacity to just seven travelers in each vehicle on wildlife drives for maximum comfort, viewing and photo opportunities. This means a window seat for everyone, though extra-secure middle seats are available for the littlest ones, if preferred.

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Important Information About This Trip

We have designed this family safari for those guests whose African dreams include the most remote wildlife experience available and who don't require over-the-top accommodations to accomplish that goal. On these trips, changes to the itinerary may occur in order to take advantage of conditions unique to the season. Depending upon availability, itineraries may run in a different order.

Age Limit on Family Botswana Safaris

We welcome children age 6 and older on our Family Botswana Safaris. However, while some 6-year-olds are well suited for our Botswana adventures, others may not be ready for the requirements of group travel. We believe it's best to consider this minimum age limit a guideline—you, as a parent or guardian, are best qualified to decide whether your child would enjoy the experience without compromising the comfort of others. We strongly encourage you to speak with one of our Adventure Specialists about the specific requirements of the trip so you can make an informed decision. We do not permit children younger than 6 on our scheduled departures due to safety regulations, physical limitations and concerns regarding group dynamics. Depending on the age of the child, children must be matched in rooms with adults for safety purposes and due to camp regulations in Botswana. Additionally, children under 13 years old are not generally able to participate in the traditional mokoro boat rides for safety reasons and children must be 16 years or older to participate in longer, optional safari walks. Alternative activities will be provided for children as appropriate.

Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to on this trip are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require medical evacuation insurance for our guests' safety. If you decline the medical evacuation insurance coverage offered by Natural Habitat, we request that you send us documentation of the independent coverage you have selected. We will add the cost of a medical evacuation policy to your tour invoice until you provide our office with proof of coverage including your insurance company's name, contact number and your individual policy number. Thank you for understanding that our policy exists exclusively in the interest of our guests' safety.

Getting There & Getting Home

This trip begins in Maun, Botswana, and ends in Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe. Because this is a long international journey, **we recommend that you arrive at least one night prior to Day 1** to rest from your travels and begin the trip refreshed. For guests who come in early, recommended hotels will be included in your pre-departure materials. You must arrive in Maun by 1:45 pm on Day 1 in order to join the group for the first scheduled activities.

You may depart Victoria Falls anytime after 1 pm on the final day.

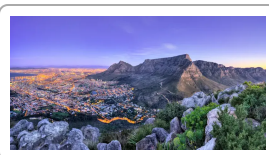

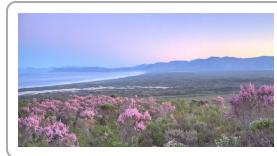

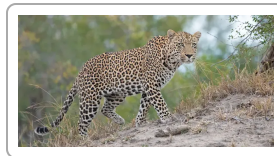
