Traverse the domain of elk, bison, moose, bighorn sheep, bald eagles, and of course bears—both black and grizzly—and search for elusive wolves in the remote Northern Range. Witness Yellowstone's remarkable geothermal sights, including Old Faithful and Mammoth Hot Springs, as we connect with the land and animals that inspired the establishment of the world's first national park in 1872.

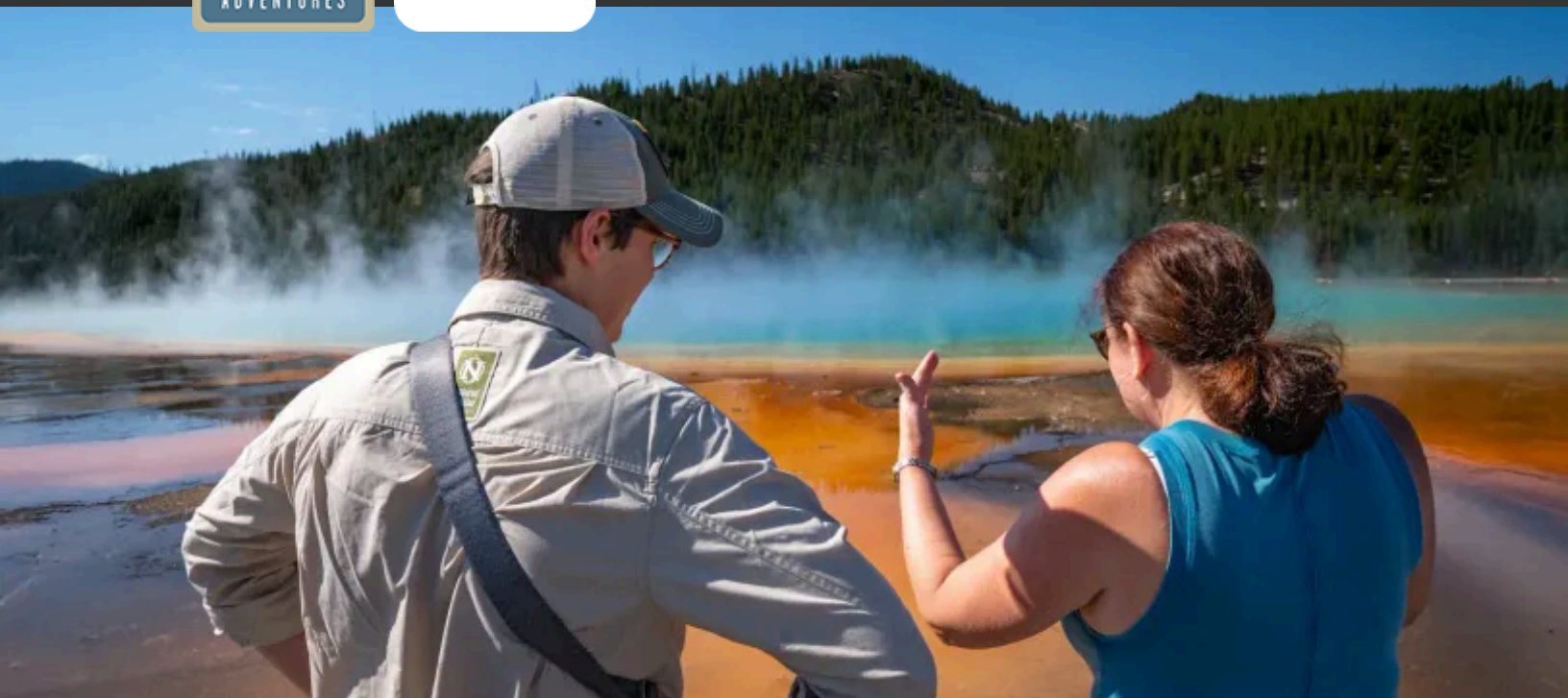

Wild Yellowstone Escape Itinerary

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BOZEMAN

Day 1: Arrive in Bozeman on the northern edge of Yellowstone country

- Visit the Smithsonian-affiliated Museum of the Rockies and its extensive dinosaur fossil collection
- Join your Expedition Leaders and fellow travelers for a welcome dinner in Bozeman

Surrounded by the Rocky Mountains just north of Yellowstone National Park, Bozeman is a historic Old West town with a rich mining, ranching and trapping heritage. Today, it has become a booming center for tourism, tech and higher education, home to Montana State University. Although our trip officially begins with a welcome dinner this evening with our Expedition Leaders and fellow adventurers, guests arriving before 1 pm have the option to visit the Museum of the Rockies with one of our Expedition Leaders. The Smithsonian-affiliated museum has an extensive collection of dinosaur fossils, planetarium and a distinctive regional focus highlighting the area's natural and cultural history.



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PARADISE VALLEY / YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK

Day 2: Follow the Yellowstone River to Mammoth Hot Springs

- Look for elk, bison and pronghorn roaming the meadows of Paradise Valley
- Walk among Mammoth Hot Springs' travertine terraces, colored by heat-loving thermophiles
- Watch for bald eagles, golden eagles and ospreys along the Yellowstone River

Big Sky Country awaits as we follow the Yellowstone River south toward the park through Montana's renowned Paradise Valley. Flanked by the Absaroka and Gallatin ranges, the valley's expansive meadows and surrounding serrated peaks offer some of the Rocky Mountain West's finest scenery. Famed for its diverse and abundant wildlife, we hope to see some of the valley's resident elk, bison and pronghorn roaming the lush grasslands, knowing that elusive grizzlies, black bears and wolves prowl the forested slopes of the surrounding mountains. Look for a range of raptors, including bald and golden eagles and osprey.

Entering Yellowstone National Park through the gateway town of Gardiner, we arrive at Mammoth Hot Springs. Here, thermal water spills over travertine terraces that have been described as a "cave turned inside out." Heat-loving microorganisms called thermophiles add distinct colors to the mineral-laden formations. Formed by volcanic activity millions of years ago, this landscape provides a vivid introduction to Yellowstone's geothermal phenomena, while prolific grazing elk are among the first of many wild animals we will see.

LAMAR VALLEY

Day 3: Search for wolves and bears in the broad Lamar Valley

- Rise early to look for wolves across Yellowstone's remote northeast corner
- Watch for grizzly bears and large herds of elk and bison in the meadows
- Follow wildlife activity with high-powered spotting scopes and updates from park researchers

Rising early, we set out in search of wolves, grizzly bears and large herds of elk and bison in the broad meadows of the Lamar Valley. Located in the park's remote northeast corner, the valley is sometimes referred to as "America's Serengeti" for its abundant and diverse wildlife. It is also one of the very best places to see wolves in the wild. In 1995, the federal government reintroduced wolves into Yellowstone amid much controversy. After a 70-year absence following their government-sanctioned eradication, the wolf population has flourished, supported by bountiful prey—and the wolves' predatory behavior has helped restore balance to the ecosystem, bringing prey numbers back to a sustainable level. But as prey has decreased and wolf hunting outside the park has increased, the frequency and proximity of wolf sightings has diminished. We do often spy them, though, as we are in constant contact with wolf researchers in the park, and our guides' high-powered spotting scopes bring their activities in for a closer view. Late this afternoon, traverse the Lamar Valley once more in hopes of spotting more wildlife before returning to Gardiner for the night.



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UPPER GEYSER BASIN

Day 4: Explore Yellowstone's geysers, hot springs and mud pots

- Watch Old Faithful send boiling water skyward
- Walk among bubbling mud pots, steaming pools and fumaroles in the Upper Geyser Basin
- Learn how fire renews Yellowstone's forests while crossing recovering burn areas

Today we take a closer look at Yellowstone's celebrated geothermal features. From bubbling mud pots and steaming thermal pools to geysers that rocket boiling water skyward, these natural phenomena have long intrigued and enchanted visitors. The park's dynamic landscape is a testament to the powerful forces shaping Earth's crust. Early explorers like John Colter and Jim Bridger revered these natural wonders, and the geothermal activity prompted the protection of the area as the world's first national park in 1872. Conservationists like Teddy Roosevelt were also inspired to protect Yellowstone's natural assets for future generations to come. Of course, we stop to witness the park's most famous geyser, Old Faithful, with ample time to watch it erupt and to walk among the nearby fumaroles and hot springs. Traversing more of Yellowstone, learn about fire ecology as we drive through recovering areas once ravaged by earlier conflagrations.

BOZEMAN

Day 5: Make a final wildlife search before departing from Bozeman

- Look for wildlife while traveling north through Paradise Valley
- Fly home from Bozeman or explore the town independently

While our Yellowstone wildlife adventure comes to a close this morning, we have a final chance for wildlife viewing as we make our way back through the Paradise Valley to Bozeman. If your flight schedule permits, you may enjoy exploring this lively western town and surroundings on your own.

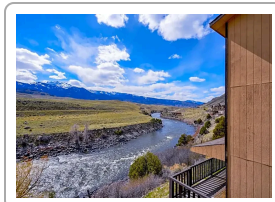

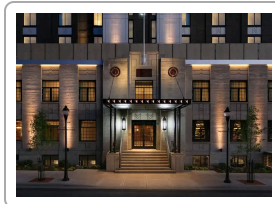

A Diversity of Seasons So You Can Choose Your Preference

No matter when you visit Yellowstone Country, you are in for an uplifting nature display. In spring, crowds are fewer, the landscape is bright green with the peaks still blanketed by snow, and babies abound: bear cubs, bison calves, moose calves, fawns and wolf pups. Bears are especially active searching for food after hibernation, and cooler temperatures tend to mean more wildlife activity. In high summer, wildflowers are in full bloom and animals are still very active. Long days allow us to rise early and linger late, maximizing time for the best wildlife viewing when visitors have left the park or aren't yet out and about for the day. Fall is splendid here, with autumn's palette of golden aspen and willow contrasting against brilliant blue skies and providing a superb backdrop for wildlife photos. Crowds are fewer again, too, as we listen for bugling elk and look for rotund bears, fattening up before winter.

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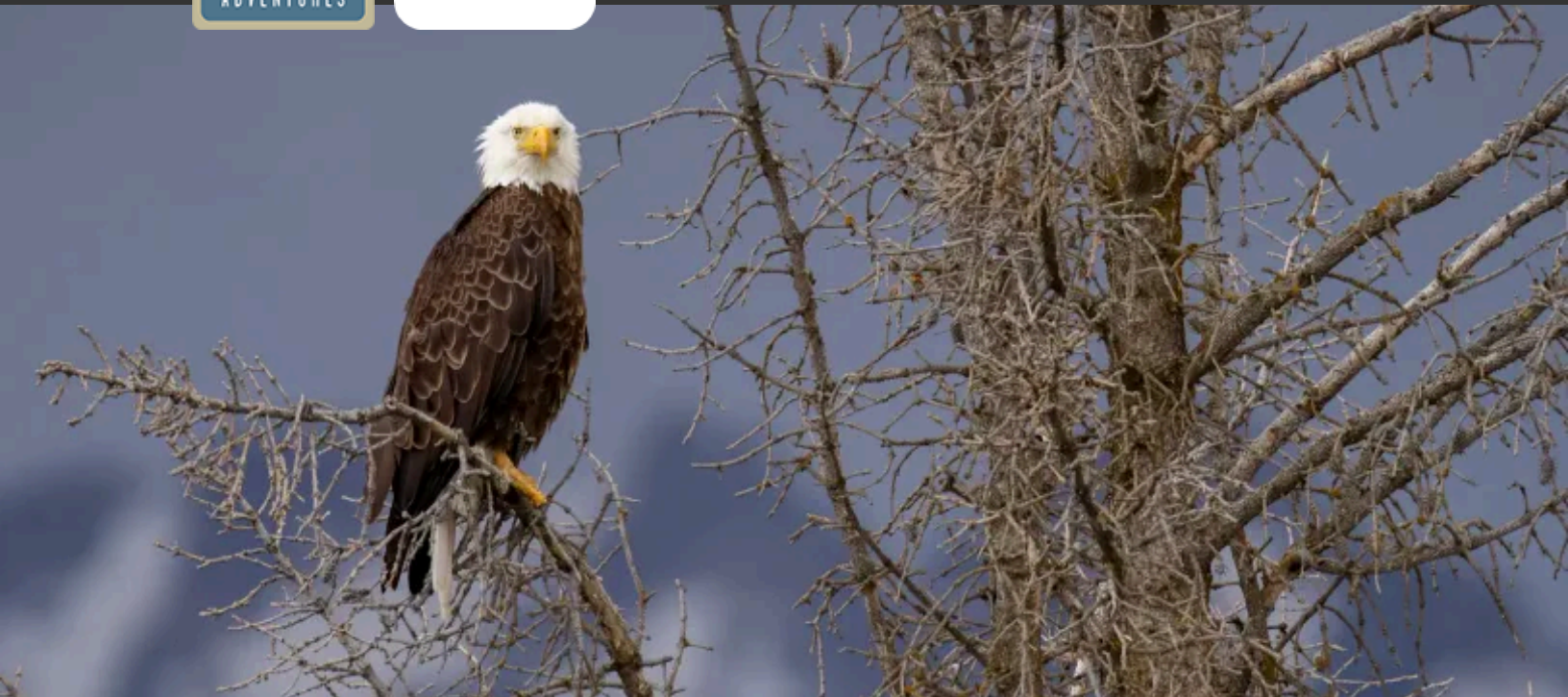

Important Information About This Trip

While the Lamar Valley and Yellowstone National Park offer some of the best opportunities to see wolves in the wild, the animals are still elusive and generally do not come within close range of humans. Since our trip offers a totally natural, uncontrived experience, most wolf viewing is done at a distance through spotting scopes. We are thus able to watch the packs go about their normal behavior uninfluenced by the presence of humans. It is important to understand that it is extremely difficult to see wolves without the use of a spotting scope (which Nat Hab provides). Often, the best way to get wolf photos is with a cell phone camera through a spotting scope. Your Expedition Leader will help you with this technique, called "digiscoping." While a long lens is a must for photographers, even then, we can't guarantee excellent shots of wolves. However, we are likely to see plenty of the region's other iconic species at closer range, and the sheer beauty and grandeur of the landscape provides magnificent nature imagery.

Our Expedition Leaders, who know the Greater Yellowstone region intimately, are adept at getting our groups to less-visited areas away from crowds. But of course, Yellowstone is a very popular destination, so be prepared for a fair amount of company no matter when you travel. We operate this Rocky Mountain safari in a manner similar to our African safaris: visiting prime wildlife locations in the early morning when viewing opportunities are best and most visitors are still asleep.

Getting There & Getting Home

This trip begins and ends in Bozeman, Montana. **You must arrive in Bozeman by 4 pm on Day 1** in order to attend a welcome dinner beginning at 6 pm. Guests arriving before 1 pm on Day 1 may join an optional visit to the Museum of the Rockies with one of our Expedition Leaders.

You may depart Bozeman any time after 12 pm on the final day.
